**Course Syllabus** 

God in the Old Testament: A Study in Dialogue

Walter Brueggemann

The course will engage us in exploring the ways God is characterized in the Old Testament.

Our **Learning Goals** include the following:

- 1. Acquire a sense of the ancient theological conversation under way in the Old Testament.
- 2. Engage with major themes and major problems in that conversation.
- 3. Gain discerning access to some textual specificity in the Old Testament.
- 4. Connect textual specificity to the current conversation among scholars.
- 5. Reflect on this conversation in relation to the faith and practice of contemporary faith communities.

Our **Final Assignment**, due the last week of class:

Select three texts (full rhetorical units) for different parts of the Old Testament canon that are unfamiliar to you. Study them and articulate from them a characterization of the God of the Old Testament *as though we had only these three texts*.
