❖ If there is one Hindu text that can be compared to the Christian Bible, it is the Bhagavad Gita. The best-loved and most well-known episode of the Bhagavad Gita is the dialogue between Krishna and Arjuna, which takes place at the moment before the climactic battle between the two sets of cousins. In this dialogue, Krishna reveals the ultimate religious truth to Arjuna, and reveals his universal form as well. This will be useful when looking at Chapter 33, "Sacred Writings".

Textual supplement: Avatars (Chapter 34, "Beliefs"):

- The Ten Avatars of Vishnu: Avatars are typically associated with Vishnu, who traditionally is said to have ten different manifestations, including Krishna and Rama. Avatars are not always human, but in every case, they descend for the specific purpose of combating a particular evil in any given age.
 - The ten avatars are as follows: first, the fish, Matsya, who saved the world from a great flood; second, the tortoise, Kurma, who allowed the gods and demons to churn up valuable objects from the ocean of milk from a pivot resting on his back; and third, the boar, Varaha, who also rescued the earth from a flood by raising it up on one of his trunks. Fourth is the man-lion, Narasimha, who came to deliver the world from a terrible demon who had obtained from the gods a special boon that prohibited him from being killed by a god, an animal, or a human. Fifth is the dwarf, Vamana, who confronted another demon who had conquered the entire universe. Sixth is the man called "Rama with the axe," Parashurama, who was a hero that destroyed the entire Kshatriya class of warriors, who were exploiting others. The next two avatars, numbers seven and eight, are the most famous—Rama and Krishna. Finally, the last two avatars are ninth, the Buddha—in this way, Hinduism was able to incorporate the whole of Buddhism into itself; and tenth, Kalki, the form of Vishnu who is still to come, and whose arrival will signal the end of the present age.

❖ In the story of "The Four Sights," the Buddha is taken out by his charioteer four different times: the first time, he sees an old man and realizes that old age is inevitable for all beings; the second time, he sees someone who is diseased, and he learns that no one is safe from pain and suffering; the third time, he sees a corpse and realizes that all life ends in death; and the final time, he sees a religious ascetic who has turned his back on temporal pleasures to seek wisdom and release from the suffering of this world. It is this final sight that prompts the Buddha to leave home and family behind.

The Life of the Buddha, a BBC documentary, references this event in the life of the Buddha between 15:45 and 21:47. This will be most useful with Chapter 38.

❖ When discussing Chapter 51, it may be helpful to discuss Christianity in Korea:

When thinking about Christianity in Korea, it is important to be aware of a unique type of Christian reflection that has come out of the Korean context, called "minjung theology."

Minjung means "people," but in this particular way of thinking, it means something more specific: people who have been oppressed, alienated and marginalized. Minjung theology then, is a specific way of talking about God, humanity and the church that seeks to emphasize freedom, grace and integrity for the Korean people.

This indigenous form of Christian thought has been heavily influenced by shamanism. Chung Hyun Kyung is one of the most important Korean Christian thinkers in the late 20th century.

Your greatest resource for this chapter is a local rabbi. Call a nearby synagogue and invite the rabbi to come to your class or to skype. Encourage the class to be prepared to ask specific questions about practice, traditions, and beliefs. Be sure to find out ahead of time which branch of Judaism your rabbi represents.

The BBC and Frontline both have multi-part documentaries that are worth reviewing even if you choose not to use the whole videos. Strong contemporary biblical scholars to look for include Bart Ehrman, John Dominic Crossan, Amy-Jill Levine, Dallas Willard, Karen Armstrong, and

Marcus Borg. The instructor needs to be prepared for the inevitable comments that a student may feel her/his faith is being challenged / misrepresented / insulted. Because of the variety of Christian beliefs, this discussion is very likely regardless of what resources you choose to use.
