**Important** ecclesiastical documents have stressed the urgency of addressing world hunger and foregrounded its natural and historical causes, from famine to global austerity measures and welfare. In this volume, biblical scholars examine passages from the Old and New Testaments, exploring the dynamics of hunger and its causation in ancient Israel and the Greco-Roman world and revealing the centrality of hunger concerns to the Bible. Kathleen O'Connor, Mary Ann Beavis, Carol Dempsey, and Sheila McGinn are among the fourteen contributors.

## Sanctified by Grace: A Theology of the Christian Life

Books on the Christian life abound. Some focus on spirituality, others on practices, and still others on doctrines such as justification or forgiveness. Few offer an account of the Christian life that portrays redeemed Christian existence within the multifaceted whole of the Christian confession. This book attempts to fill that gap by providing a constructive, specifically theological interpretation of the Christian life according to the nature of God's grace. This means coordinating the Triune God's reconciling, justifying, redemptive, restorative, and otherwise transformative action with those practices of the Christian life emerging from God's grace. The doctrine of the Christian life developed here unifies doctrine and life, confession and practice within the divine economy of grace. John Burgess, Ellen Charry, Stephen Long, Ian McFarland, and John Webster are among the fifteen contributors.

The letter to the Galatians, a key source for Pauline theology, presents Paul's understanding of justification, the gospel, and many topics of keen contemporary interest. In this volume, twenty-three distinguished scholars offer cutting-edge scholarship on how Galatians
